Your Guide to 50 Days of Prayer

Between April 6 (Easter) and May 24 (Pentecost), you are invited to join your church community in 50 days of intentional prayer. The Season of Prayer is an opportunity to reflect on the role of Hillsdale Community Church UCC in your life, in the community, and in the world.

What is Prayer? Prayer is making a connection with God. Sometimes prayer involves talking. Sometimes prayer involves listening. All the time, prayer is making time and space to be intentional in your relationship with God.

Prayer Gatherings. For those who find that their prayer is strengthened by group experiences, those who do not know how to pray, or those who are out of the habit of prayer and would like a restart, check the calendar of prayer gatherings. There are a variety of options and times for gathering to pray.

Prayer At Home. Each day, an email is sent with a scripture of the day,

a prayer practice to try, and particular prayer requests for the church building, programs, and directory. If you do not receive those emails but would like to, please send a request to tim@hillsdaleucc.org.

Prayer during Meetings.

As we gather for meetings and classes, consider adding prayer to our time together. Pray for one another, pray for our church and pray for others. You may wish to use your own prayer practice, to choose the

prayer practice from the daily prayer email or to use this format.

Read from Scripture. (Suggested daily reading here: http://lectionary.library. vanderbilt.edu/daily.php?year=B)

Pay Attention. Allow a moment or two of silence while all consider how God is still speaking through this reading.

Share. Invite each person to share God's message to him or her. Use this not as a conversation time, but a time of deep listening.

Pray. Pray out loud for one another, based on your sharing. You may want to pray spontaneously, or pray in order (such as "pray for the person on the left").

Group Prayer. End with a group prayer such as the Lord's Prayer.

Enter the Season of Prayer

You are strongly encouraged to join with your faith community in prayer for one or more of these gatherings. All gatherings are appropriate for all levels of experience in



prayer. All gatherings are drop-in and free of charge, except as noted. Childcare is planned where noted, and always available with 24-hour notice to Hillsdale UCC 503-246-5474.

Doodle Prayer. Praying in colors and shapes bypasses the logical side of our brain, taps into our intuition and creativeness, and helps us to pray more freely. Age: All.

Intercessory Prayer. Learn to or practice praying out loud. The focus is on the needs and concerns of others. Age: Adult.

Lectio Divina. A Latin term meaning "divine reading," Lectio Divina describes a way of reading the Scriptures whereby we gradually let go of our own agenda and open ourselves to what God wants to say to us. Age: Adult. Location: Sanctuary.

Prayer Retreat. A time of personal and group reflection, learning, and sharing. Age: Adult, childcare provided. Location: Fellowship Hall. RSVP requested. Cost: Purchase of study guide \$20.

Praying at Home. Quick tips and practices to help you pray at meals, bedtimes, and other occasions at home. Age: All. Location: Sanctuary.

Praying the Lectionary. Reading and reflecting on the scripture for the coming Sunday and listening for the stillspeaking God. Age: Adult. Location: Mt Hood Room

Reluctant Meditators. Those of us who find meditation most difficult are the ones who need it most! New and seasoned meditators welcome as we share a Christian meditation practice called centering prayer. Age: Teen/Adult. Location: Maple Room.

Taizé. Service of music, participatory prayer, and silence designed to achieve a contemplative state. Age: Adult. Location: Maple Room.

From the Pastor

ay will be an exciting month at Hillsdale UCC. Having received a second bid, we will be able to move ahead with the permitting and elevatorordering—another step toward beginning our long-awaited construction.

On the whole, as I told you in worship on April 12, I think we are doing the right thing to improve and modernize this building which is our collective greatest asset.

It is, however, a concern of mine that we might begin to think that we are installing an elevator so that the 85 of us gathered here on Sunday mornings can ride up and down for an hour.

Instead, we give generously—sacrificially, even—not to something that belongs to us: the people we like and the people like us and the people sitting here now. We give generously sacrificially, even—exactly because this building does NOT belong to us. This building is a gift, passed on to us by others for us to hold until we can pass it on again: not just with the people we like, or who are not messy, or who can give us something in return, or who think like us—but for all people.

Recently, members of the Consistory and Foundation visited Mt. Tabor Presbyterian Church, which has, in the last four years, transformed its building into a community center. Every room is in use most every hour of every day: a coffee shop buzzes with customers, children play in a small toy corner while their parents chat nearby, there is a writer's group meeting in one room, an AA meeting in another, some people are there to learn about organic gardening techniques, and some others are there to plan a campaign to help immigrants have safety and rights. There is a feeding program for the poor in the basement and somewhere else a kid's birthday party is in full swing. The Sanctuary doors are flung open, and signs invite visitors to meditate or pray or light candles in this sacred space. The doors are unlocked all day. That building is alive! As we move ahead with this campaign, this is the vision that we must have for this building as well, if we are follow Christ's teaching in all that we do.

Is Taborspace at times inconvenient for those who share the space? Yes. Is it messy? Most assuredly yes. Do the folks of Mt. Tabor Pres sometimes wish they could spread out into their space in all the ways they used to? I do not doubt that the answer is yes.

But are they doing what Chrsit has called them to? Is

everything they owned held in common? Yes, yes, yes. Let our answer to Christ's calling also be YES, YES, YES.

Community Garden Plans Work Party

an and I are in Boston spending time with our family. The city has been alive with Marathon activities, sold-out Red Sox games, and excitement is in the air as the spring flowers are blooming and the snow has melted.

I've been struck by the strong sense of community and kind

behaviors that have deepened after the tragedy of the Marathon bombing and the ensuing trial of the accused. A woman on the "T" (Boston's version of the Max) actually gave up her seat for me without being asked. She heard my daughter tell me there were no seats available and she quickly stood up and offered her prized seat on the crowded train. I noted others stepping aside to allow room to walk on the congested sidewalks, and there was less honking of horns on the busy Boston streets. *Boston Strong...*

My family walked to a spot where they would watch the Marathon runners go by; I stayed at the house and watched the runners on TV. As I watched in amazement at the masses of people demonstrating endurance and determination to keep going in cold and rainy conditions, I noted an older man being held up—completely supported—by a younger man. The older man would have fallen to the street if he were not being held. The younger man had let go of his personal interest in reaching the finish line and hoping to make good time. He did what was best for the older man and helped him get to and cross the finish line standing up. *Boston Strong...*

Isn't this what Christians do? What we at Hillsdale Community Church UCC do? Aren't we experiencing prayer in a new way and holding each other up, watching out for what is better for each other and the world beyond our doors?

As we continue on our prayer journey toward Pentecost, let us continually pay attention to God and pray for the direction our church should go in the future. *Hillsdale Community Church UCC Strong!*
